Bucharest graphic artist Anai Greog's namesake collection draws liberally from her portfolio of circular imagery as well as photos and sketches from her travels.

## Jaipur Rugs

**Finding beauty** in bedlam, design director Kavita

Chaudhary conceived Chaos Theory as a celebration of nature, in particular the spontaneity of water flowing. For some in the collection, she first printed the forms in batik, then translated them to the loom. **Kali**, referring to the Indian goddess of time, is meant to resemble the random texture of cloth used to wipe away paint. **Geb**, named for the Egyptian god of earth, takes cues from the facets of gemstones. Both are handwoven from silk and wool in India, where the manufacturer engages 40,000 artisans in 600 villages.
